A Message from ESWA's President Dear Writers.

Just a few short weeks ago, over two hundred writers gathered at Chesapeake College for the sold-out Bay to Ocean Writers Conference. They came to network, meet new friends and learn how to improve their writing craft.

While I was there, I spoke to a couple who had driven over three hours to attend their forth consecutive BTO conference. One of them said that they attend a few writers conferences every year and their goal is to learn at least one new thing that they can put into practice right away. So I had to ask... "Have you found that one new thing yet?" The woman responded, "Yes. I learned that I need to focus less on making my writing perfect and more on making my writing honest."

I didn't get to go to any of the BTO sessions this year due to my responsibilities as a presenter and an ESWA officer. But I learned one new thing at the BTO, and I learned it from that couple. That honesty statement haunted me on my two-hour ride home. It got me thinking about how "true" my own writing is (or isn't), and over the following week I was rewriting several chapters with that in mind. Without that brief encounter, I wouldn't have shifted my focus and shaken a personal boredom I was having with my own writing. It set me in motion again and agitated me out of a stall.

Sometimes, connecting with one writer in a casual conversation can inspire change that moves our writing forward. One moment - one idea offered from one writer to another, can make a difference. And helping you make connections with other writers is ESWA's mission, so we feel especially grateful to have this hard-working group of volunteers put on the annual BTO. Their contribution magnifies our mission.

On behalf of the ESWA Board, I congratulate the BTO Committee under the leadership of Judy Reveal and Rick Barton, for again pulling off one of the most well rounded annual writing events on the peninsula. And thank you to all who attended, shared ideas and offered support to one another. Until the next writer's conference, we hope to see some of you at some of our writers meet-ups and workshops.



ESWA member Hal Wilson's new release is *A Taste of Salt.* Reconciliation with the past is at the heart of the novel: reconciliation that comes slowly and with difficulty for my characters. And even then accommodation comes only fleetingly. The irony of the story is that the only character free of this struggle is an octoroon slave. She's the only one, as Shakespeare's sonnet says, who is lord and owner of her face. In two parallel narratives time is carried forward in a small chest faced with an archetypal circular design and the date 1810. Its dark contents

resonate across the years from the Georgia frontier to a strange diner in small town Maine in 1967. In the chest are ordinary articles that testify to unspeakable events from the past: events that refuse to resign their hold on the present.

The book also features an excellent introduction by Melissa Reddish that outlines the mythological elements in the novel. She shows how these elements serve to tie the two parallel stories together. Melissa is a professor of English and director of the Honors Program at Wor-Wic Community College in Salisbury, MD. Her latest book is *My Father is an Angry Storm Cloud*.




First Time is a collection of ten short stories by **Frank E Hopkins**. While each story has separate characters they are linked by the theme that each story exposes the main character to the first




time they experience an event participated in by all. The stories include anticipation of the happiness they expect; the dismay and wonder they feel during

the event; and the surprising ending. *First Time* is available in ebook and paperback format on Amazon.com and in local Delmarva bookstores.

Below is one of his featured poems about a man who is dear to my heart, as well as Cameron and many, many others who have come to respect this life served well. He is buried in my home town of Rochester, NY. Yes, it is Frederick Douglass, a great statesman and personal friend of Abraham Lincoln, an outstanding testimony to two men at a time when friendships such as that were just not to be.

A Man You Know

A man cascaded by ever-raining bigots, Born into a Slave land, Severed from the word "Freedom," A man you know all too well.

A man enameled by a life from restrictions, Living within a Slave land, Motivated within the confines of the Southern nomenclature, A man you know all too well.

A man swifted by actions for necessary rights, Fighting for freedom from the Slave land, A pen perpetuates his dire circumstances, ה ווומוו צטע הווטיע מוו נטט יעכוו.

A man who sufficed so much for the enrichment of others, Living free from the Slave land, Indicative to his times, speculative of the future, A man you know all too well.

A man pursued by the menaces of past enslavement, Embodiment of the essence of Black pride, His ability cascades the mental arena we stand in today, A man you know all too well. Innuendoes and eloquence surface through his trails, Passing through indifferent walls of persecution, A man opposed by many, but followed by more, A man you know all too well.

Never complacent, free of his past rejections, Conveyed through the souls of all free men, A man only fueled by freedom's fumes, A man you know all too well.

A composer, an artist of slavery's heartbreaks, A father, a founder of many free minds, A "Doug" down man, "less" contempt with brotherly bloodshed, Wait! You know this man, don't you? Did you get it?

Frederick, torn by past enslavement and ruthless tribulations, Frederick, deadly to the oppressor, but heavenly to the free man, Frederick, a cancer to bigotry, but a cure to suffering restrictions, Frederick, levier of sorrow, destructor of deemed restrictions, Frederick, a leader, impervious to lassitude, Frederick, death to the slaver, life to the slavee, Frederick, scarred from the lashes of Justice, but empowered by this day, today, Frederick Douglass, a man you know all too well.

ESWA's History – An Ongoing Project

WHO? She was **Mona Van Duyn**, a small-town Midwesterner. She graduated from Iowa State Teachers College, after having to plead with her father to let her go to college. Married for more than 60 years, she and her husband both taught at Washington University in St. Louis.

She was a poet. Awarded the Pulitzer Prize in 1991 for her poem, "Near Changes," she was named Poet Laureate Consultant in Poetry in 1992, the first woman to hold that post.

Her obituary (December 4, 2004) in the *Washington Post*, described someone "whose lyrics of love, everyday life and the transcendent power of art made her one of the nation's most honored poets . . . "

WHY? Why have I shared the above? Because I need to right a wrong, to fill in a blank. Our 30-year history booklet, *I Vaguely Recall*, mentions that ESWA's monthly meetings have included several noteworthy speakers, including two (state) Poets Laureates. Subsequent research has disclosed that we have had three Poets Laureates as monthly meeting guests. Mona Van Duyn was the guest speaker at ESWA's January 9, 1993 meeting.



Call for Submissions to Beach Reads



The popular Rehoboth Beach Reads Short Story Contest opened for submissions on March 1. Writers are invited to submit short (500-3,500 word) "beach reads," the kinds of stories people enjoy reading while on vacation. Each story must incorporate the year's theme and also have a connection to Rehoboth Beach (**the writer does not have to live in Rehoboth**). This year's theme is "Beach Nights."

Browseabout Books in Rehoboth Beach is the sponsor for the contest, which offers a \$500 cash prize for first place, \$250 for second place, and \$100 for third place. The top 25 or so stories chosen by a panel of judges will be included in the book *Beach Nights*, which will be published by Cat & Mouse Press by the end of the year. "It's a wide-open theme that could evoke romance, mystery, humor, family intrigue, or just about anything."


